Course Description	In this course students will learn both the history and movements of "Noh Theatre" which was founded 650 years ago and is registered as an Intangible Cultural Heritage. Students will acquire skills of the Utai (Noh chanting) the basic fundamentals of Noh. Furthermore, students will learn to describe the feelings and the scene through lines and Noh chanting and learn to have the correct stance and use abdominal breathing techniques. At the same time, students will learn the movements of Noh by keeping in mind the "kamae (stance)" and "suriashi (shuffling of the feet)". Students will become the main actor of the play and show their elegant movements and posture at the end of the semester presentation.

This course aims to develop students' skills in preparation for the end of the semester presentation. Students will learn the knowledge, elegant movement and posture of Noh acting. The unique culture of Noh is that through repetition, students' level of accuracy will rise and be able to fill the empty space with their acting on stage. The students' aim is to become as skillful as the Japanese Traditional Art and Culture group (Kita Noh Circle) who devote their training to Noh regularly, and where the instructor belongs to. By the end of the course, students should be able to view the world from various perspectives, leading to inter-cultural understanding and open-mindedness toward other cultures.
